BELIEVE

Have someone in your group read aloud: Genesis 25:19-34.

Ask these questions to prompt group discussion:

- 3. People often tend to view Bible characters through rose colored lenses, treating them as model examples of virtue and godliness. But Isaac, Rebekah, Jacob, and Esau are none of these. What do you make of the way the Bible speaks candidly about the brokenness of the people in Genesis?

Leader Context:

- God seems to always use broken people. There are no other kinds of people.
- These people didn't come out of a family that was so broken that God couldn't use them.

4. Despite Jacob's deceptive behavior and Esau's shortsightedness, God's plan for Jacob to inherit the birthright is fulfilled. How does this passage demonstrate God's sovereignty and ability to work through flawed human actions to accomplish His purposes? How does this give us hope and assurance in our own lives?
